## Summary of Voting Structure Options

- Say we have four proposals:
- A
- B
- C
- D

And $A$ and $B$ are mutually exclusive (meaning they cannot both be implemented), C and D can be implemented independently and/or in combination with any other proposal.

Summary of Voting Structure Options

## Option 1:

1. A
2. B
3. C
4. D

- Vote on all four proposals separately ("do you support proposal $x$ " and "do you support proposal $x$ over the status quo")
- If $A$ and $B$ both get over $50 \%$ on both questions, then we rank order them as main and alternate motions at the MRC.
- If C and/or D get over $50 \%$ on both, then they go as independent proposals to the MRC to be voted separately.


## Option 2:

1. A
2. B
3. C
4. D
5. $A+C$
6. $A+D$
7. $A+C+D$
8. $B+C$
9. $B+D$
10. $\mathrm{B}+\mathrm{C}+\mathrm{D}$
11. $\mathrm{C}+\mathrm{D}$

For each, vote on support and status quo questions. Options that receive over $50 \%$ on both questions are rank ordered as main and alternate motions at the MRC.
